## **PREFACE**

If you are privileged, as I have been, to travel all over the world in pursuit of Shakespearean knowledge, it becomes apparent that, in certain places and certain countries, there are often individuals who seem to be right at the heart of almost every facet of activity. Kolkata and West Bengal indeed are such places, where there is one man who, to paraphrase Shakespeare, bestrides Eastern India like a colossus. In that corner of the subcontinent a lot of conversations about Shakespeare eventually wend their way round to Professor Amitava Roy.

I first heard him addressing a gathering of scholars from many countries at a conference, and was struck, not just by his deep and intimate knowledge of his subject, but also by his warmth and generosity towards younger and less experienced scholars. We soon became friends, and on my subsequent visits we would often share platforms, lead workshops, and eventually sit together on the editorial board of two UGC CARE-listed journals, *Theatre International* and the *International Journal of Culture Studies and Social Sciences*. In working alongside him in this context I had the opportunity to observe at close quarters not only his insight, but also his rigour as an editor, qualities which he brings to bear in his approach to the most enigmatic play in Shakespeare's canon, *Hamlet*.

To begin to describe the lifetime of knowledge and experience he brings to this task is daunting. As Cominius says, when asked 12 Hamlet

to describe Coriolanus' qualifications, "I shall lack voice". (Coriolanus, IIii, 69). The international scholars who frequently seek him out, the academics who regularly cite him in their publications, the students who come to sit at his feet, (quite literally in the case of the seminar room at the Shakespeare Society of Eastern India headquarters), those who have learned to perform Shakespeare in working with him, those who have been mentored and encouraged by him over the years, all can speak of that. Let me speak of those things of which I have the closest experience. As co-founder and President of the SSEI, he has worked tirelessly over the decades, bringing together students and scholars, organising courses, conferences, workshops and performances, publishing journals, books and other materials, lobbying and promoting, advocating and proselytising, fundraising, fighting and championing Shakespeare through good times and bad. My own research and practice have been deepened and enriched by my visits to SSEI, and the lively discussions and insightful presentations I have been privileged to attend there. But at the heart of all of this activity is Amitava's own work, as writer, researcher, speaker, translator and editor.

Professor Roy is a figurehead, but is ably supported by others, most notably in recent years by Dr Tapu Biswas, (D.Litt), Joint Secretary of SSEI, and a formidable scholar in his own right. The two of them have collaborated on this fascinating edition of *Hamlet*, which brings forward contextual and supporting materials offering vital insights to researchers and students who seek to understand the significance and relevance of *Hamlet* to contemporary India. The edition covers a great many topics. In the Introduction the editors offer a comprehensive exploration of the central questions arising from the play, including the sources, the Revenge theme, Hamlet's relationships with Gertrude and Ophelia, his encounters with the Ghost, Polonius and Laertes, the importance of the

interactions with the Players, and his eventual confrontation with Death. But these, and others, are seen particularly from an Indian perspective. Roy and Biswas examine *Hamlet* closely in comparison with the great classical epics of the *Mahabharata* and the *Ramayana*, Sanskrit dramas and the folk theatre traditions from all across India. Analogues from Indian translations and adaptations are also examined.

The Appendices offer a wealth of insight. Among the supporting materials two long running contemporary Bangla adaptations are covered, Asit Basu's *Kolkatar Hamlet* (1972, 1975) and Bratya Basu's *Hamlet, Prince of Garanhata* (2006). The excerpts presented here give a fascinating glimpse of how modern India is responding to Shakespeare's masterpiece. Also included is the "To be or not to be" soliloquy from Pratima Das's Hindi translation, (in both Roman and Devnagari script) widely acclaimed as the best modern Hindi translation. The editors published this translation serially in *Theatre International* between 2013 and 2021. Hindi translation first began around 1895, and there have been a number of notable versions, including that of Harivansh Rai Bachchan the well known poet and Professor of English (and also the father of legendary Bollywood star Amitav Bachchan, who starred in numerous revenge-themed Shakespeare-inspired Hindi films such as *Sholay*).

Roy and Biswas' offering is very much an 'Indian' edition of Hamlet. Roy and Biswas underline the Indian connections, not just in the Introduction and Appendices, but also in the annotations and glossary. It is an *Indianised* and contemporised Hamlet, that brings Denmark and India together, juxtaposing Elsinore, classical and modern Kolkata and Delhi together in a novel and important manner. This remarkable edition should find itself a secure place in schools, colleges and universities as well as being of enormous interest to all those who love and care for the position of Shakespeare around the world.
